The Cornelia Hahn Oberlander International Landscape Architecture Prize

The Cultural Landscape Foundation (TCLF) has established the Cornelia Hahn Oberlander International Landscape Architecture Prize, the first and only prize in landscape architecture to include a US\$100,000 monetary award. Conferred biennially beginning in 2021, the Oberlander Prize will also feature two years of related public engagement activities to honor a living practitioner, collaborative, or team for their creative, courageous, and visionary work in the field of landscape architecture.

The Oberlander Prize will be administered by TCLF. Overseen by John Beardsley, its dedicated, independent curator, the Oberlander Prize is an integral part of TCLF's core programming, which also includes *What's Out There*®, *Pioneers of American Landscape Design*®, and *Landslide*®, initiatives that are widely recognized and have received multiples honors.
