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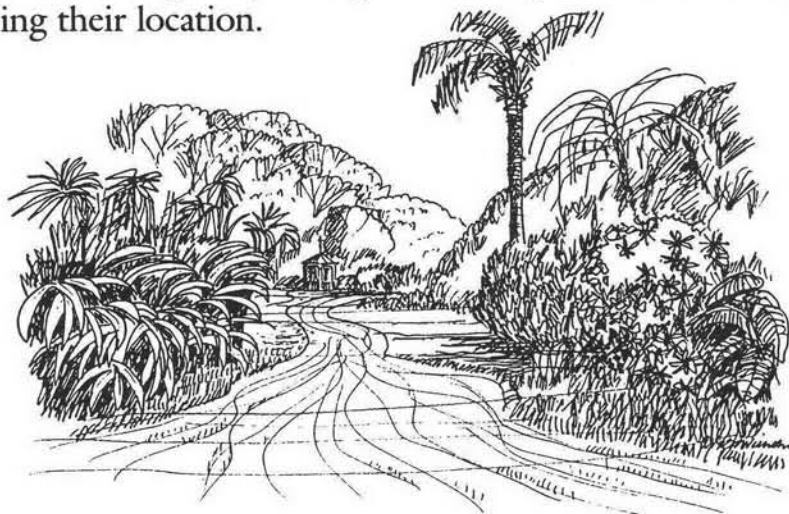
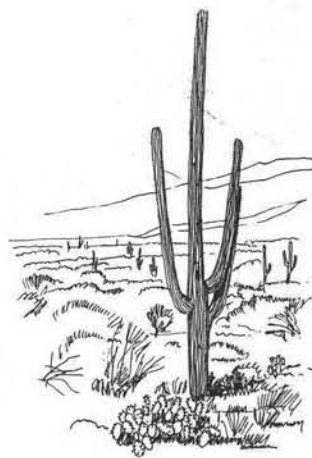

Revised and completely updated, this new edition includes more than 1,000 concise entries, organized by state and city, listing specific details on the location, hours, and history of each garden. 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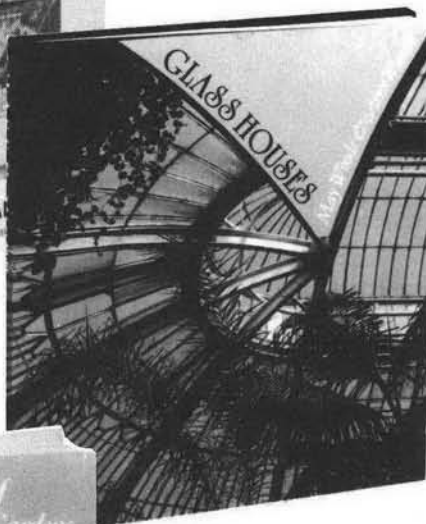
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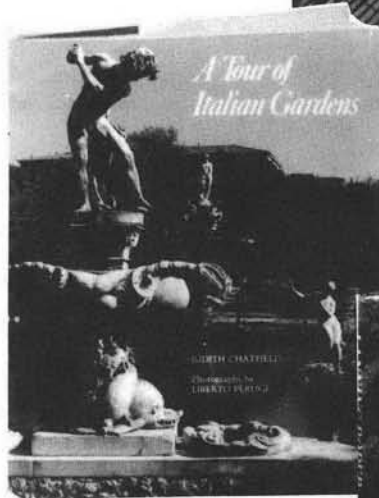
GREEN ARCHITECTURE

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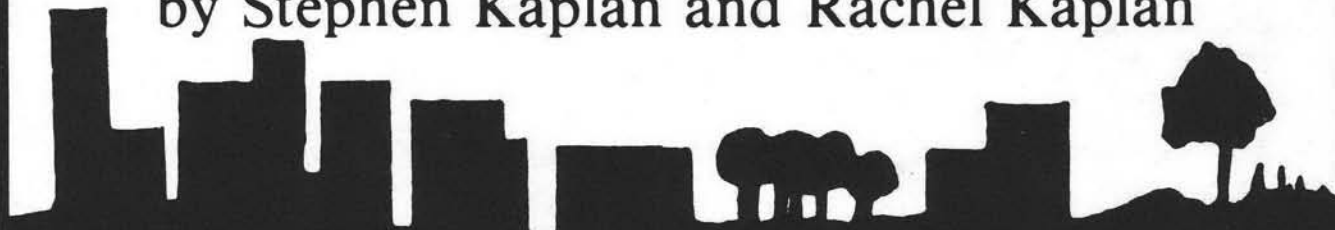
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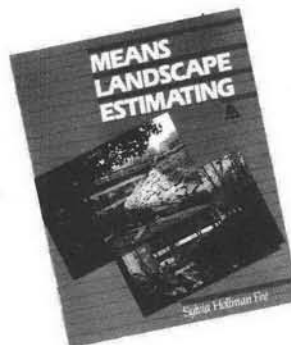


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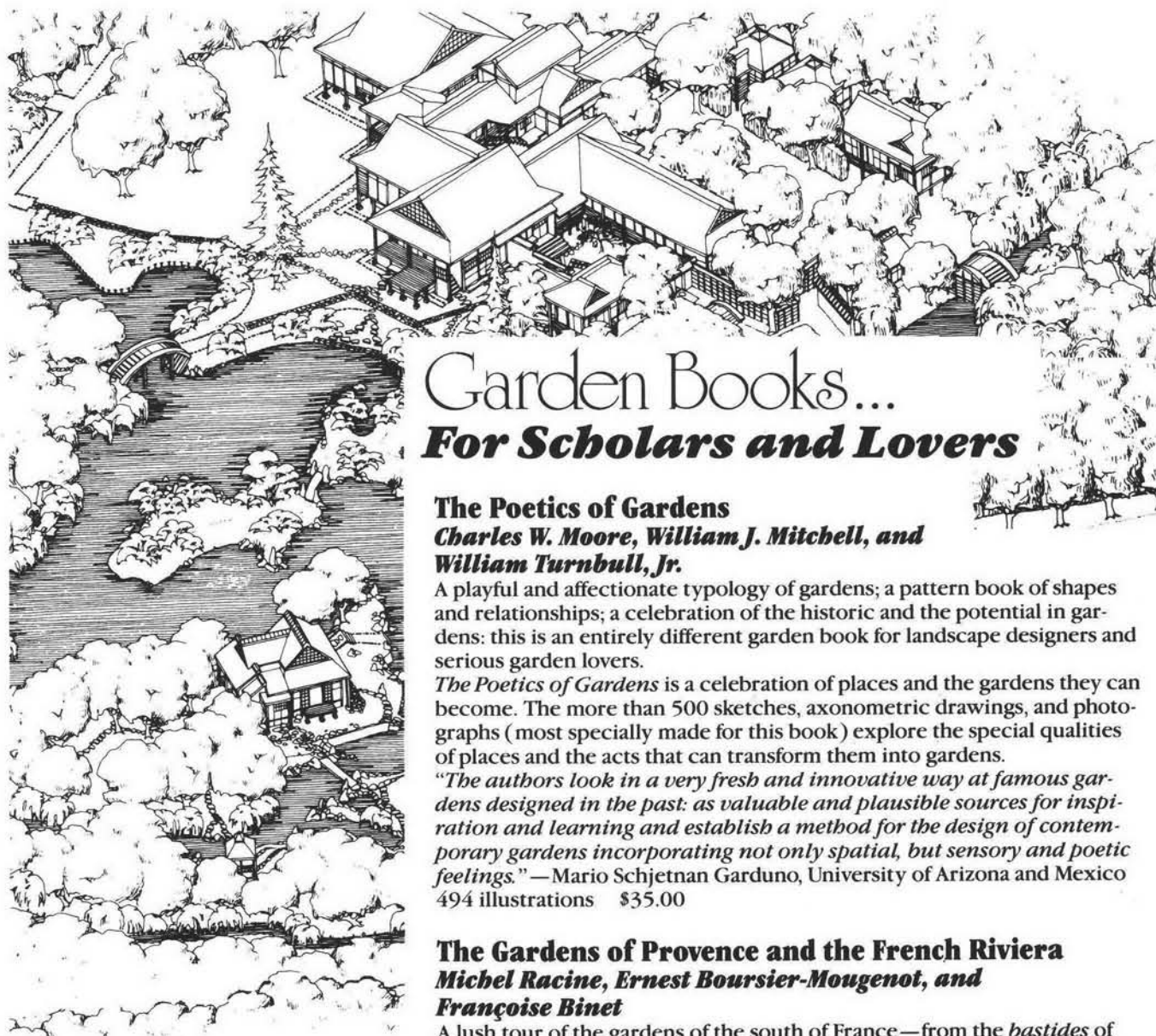
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
